All creators should have a working understanding of the royalties they are entitled to when their music is streamed online, played on the radio or broadcast in a restaurant, club, bar, fitness club or live event venue.

There are 2 copyrights in a song:

- the **master** or **sound recording** and
- the **lyrics & composition** or **musical work**

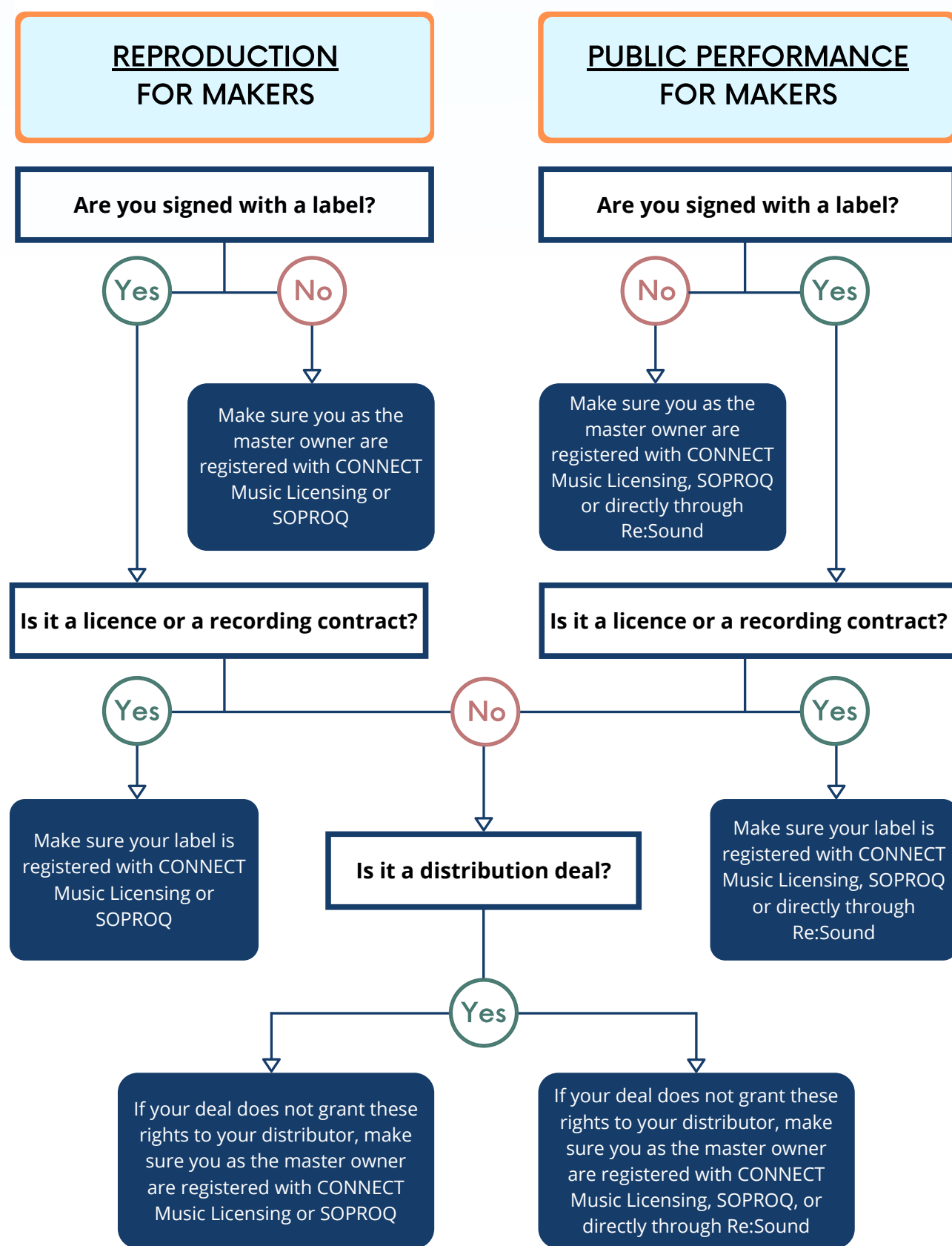
There are also 2 primary royalty types for each copyright:

- the **reproduction** or **copying** of the copyright and
- the **public performance** of the copyright

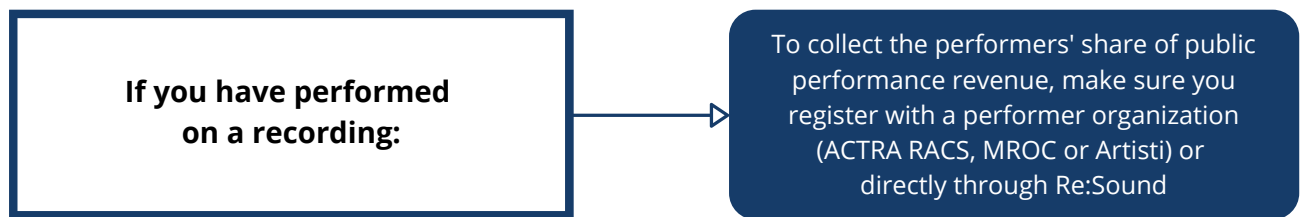
THE SOUND RECORDING FOR ARTISTS AND PERFORMERS

PUBLIC PERFORMANCE FOR PERFORMERS



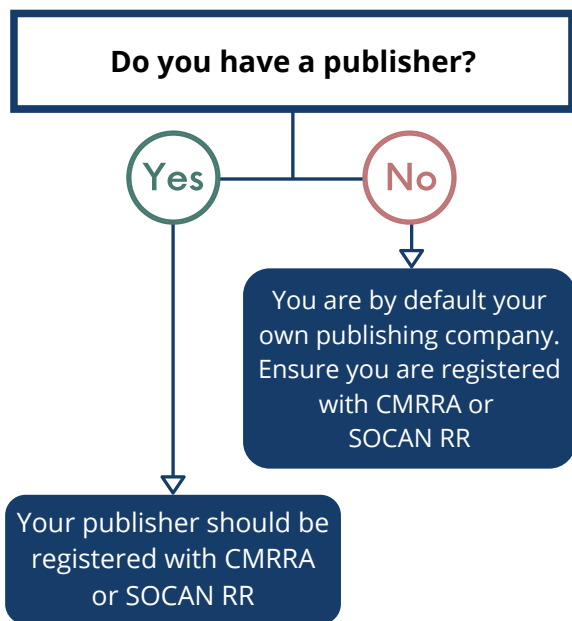
